Once again the ladies did a fantastic job with the Buffet and everyone was very complimentary about the whole evening. We as usual kept it free for members to attend and its timing in our calendar means that it gets everyone back together just before the riding season kicks off.

With everything booked and confirmed for our Rutland Water Rally in late July, we as a Committee were confident of putting on a great Event. Then I received a bombshell of a phone call from Andy at Sycamores. He'd received an email from Lyndon Top Campsite cancelling our confirmed reservation, with no explanation. We spent the next few days searching for an alternative site without much success. They were all either fully booked or just not suitable. One place we did visit on our search was the Fox & Hounds, which is set right in the heart of the lovely village of Exton, which is about a mile north of Rutland Water. The striking establishment is run by Chapter members Walter & Sandra, who, I was aware were keen to hold an event there. Concerns over the close proximity of the neighbour's were quashed by Walter, although camping space is at a premium, it was decided to hold a restricted numbers event there. been hard at work either cancelling or rearranging everything. All seems to be sorted now and we have even managed to keep the same two bands, something we were keen to do!

I have had new Tickets printed and they were available for the first time at the Custom Show, where sales went extremely well. As mentioned above it is a restricted numbers event and we are not over advertising it, but I am pretty confident it will sell out. So please don't leave it too late in buying your Tickets. They are available from Sycamores direct, by post by downloading the application form on the Rally page of our website or from me at Chapter events and meetings. There definitely will be no on the gate admittance!

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## RICHARD'S MUSINGS



January and now February. I was talking with big Pete and Neil at the January branch meeting regarding the new proposed laws re motorcycling that could come in through the EU

I remember coming back from Isle of Wight last September and meeting some MAG guys taking



part in a day of protest. To be honest I don't think it concerned me too much although I accepted they had a point. Looking back now I feel a bit selfish that I felt that it would not affect my biking. I decided to do a bit of research and I give credit to the guys who put these on the net.

So what is proposed?

ABS compulsory on all bikes over 125cc -Switch-able ABS on large bikes might be okay. I haven't got it on my fat boy. Some might have it if they have relatively new Harleys. How effective is it? ABS allows you to steer with the brakes applied in a car. Are we capable of that on a bike? The juries out. Also it's something else to go wrong and will it be an MOT fail if the ABS light is u/s.

Anti-tampering rules - Proposed to stop us fitting any component not recommended by the bike manufacturer, i.e. exhausts, ignition tuners, air filters, choice of tires, etc. Could it mean that if it's not in the Harley parts manual then we could have problems?

Would it put Custom Chrome, Kuryakyn, etc. and all the suppliers and manufacturers of non Harley authorised parts out of business. It's also rumored that it would result in the banning of home maintenance, meaning that only qualified and registered professional mechanics could work on the bike. Might fall foul though of restrictive practices.

Compulsory emissions monitoring - Fitting bikes with electronic systems which monitor all aspects of a bike's performance. It would then limit them to a low-power limp-home mode if any 'issues' are detected.

And if we do decide not to adhere to proposals 1 -3, we could have random road-side inspections, aimed to make sure we are not breaking the rules. That will keep the police busy.

Banning of bikes (and other vehicles) over 7 years old from cities - This one is to be tried out in nine cities in France where vehicles will have to be Euro emissions compliant in order to enter. Hopefully Harleys will comply but maybe not a two stroke Lambretta!

Compulsory full-sleeve hi-viz clothing for both riders and pillions. (This is already planned I believe

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for France and the Irish Republic). – I have started to notice more and more sports bike riders wearing hiviz and I have a bright yellow waterproof jacket (it was free). I have also seen hi-viz hog waist coats for sale. This is definitely one I can see as being one that is on the cards. Unlike proposals 1-5, its one where the police can tell with minimal effort if your complying!

here might be others and I recommend that you view the MAG website and facebook sites for further details. Although the British government might say they don't intend to implement them, If the EU says there in, past form means we will get them here to the letter whilst everybody else then b\*\*\*\*y ignores them.

As a footnote - If anyone has any more info on what we are likely to face and what we can do about it, speak up and the next HOG meeting.

## **CALIFORNIA**

California was having a heat wave in January with temperatures 20 degrees higher than usual. This helped to make our 48 hour bike tour a joy.

Leaving Eaglerider's head office on El Segundo



Boulevard (remember to show your HOG card for discount on hire – 10%) ur journey started. To say the roads in Los Angeles

are well maintained is rather stretching the truth!

The initial destination was going to be the Big Sur but we knew it would be a long ride. Armed with two simple road maps (including a Hertz from hiring the Dodge Challenger – sigh from David), we headed north. Or shall I say tried to; the hand-drawn map could have been better. It took a while, but eventually we reached the coast via Vista Del Mar, Jefferson and Lincoln Boulevard.

Large sea swells were forecast that day so

thoughts of a massive wave coming out of nowhere and dragging us into the sea were in the back is my



mind especially as the Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) is, as its name says, next to the sea! Contrary to the weather reports the ocean was fairly flat with not enough power to satisfy the surfer dudes whose hundreds of RVs (recreational vehicles - great big camper vans), were parked, for many miles, close to the shoreline.

At one point, just north of Malibu we saw lots of cars, rescue vehicles, a crane and people with binoculars peering over the edge of the 'cliff'. We

decided not to rubberneck surmising that some sort of vee-hi-cal had gone over the edge and the emergency services were



retrieving it. This road wasn't strictly Route 1 but a stretch of coast road slightly to the west of the famous highway.

Some of PCH runs inland and there was a déjà vu moment when, all of a sudden, we were riding across reclaimed land which was set aside for farming; miles of it, just like being in the Fens! Each to his/her own. Once through this area it was time for a stop to stretch our legs and get some lunch in San Beunaventura (close to Ventura Naval Base). This would have been simpler had we been fluent in Spanish or Mandarin. With a lot of pointing and gesticulating we had a sandwich and set off again on the 101 again.

I cannot remember much about this section of the journey except being by the sea, which is much cooler on the bike than being inland, and that the quality of the roads was soooo much better. Thirst was kicking in so it was time for a coffee break. We

(worth
knowing
as they

have free wi-fi which is really useful if you want to look at maps, find out what there is to do in the area). It was clear now that Big Sur was going to be a trip too far. We asked the waiter for recommendations around an hour's drive away. Solvang, a Danish

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settlement in the heart of California's wine growing country sounded perfect. Using our iPad we found, and booked, a reasonably priced motel, The Hamlet, in the heart of the town.

Back on the 101/route 1 we headed up to Buelton and then took the 246E to Solvang. Wow! People may tell you that this place has lost its character in order to cater for tourists but it felt like we had ridden onto a film set complete with festive



lights, mini windmills, twee houses with gingerbread feel and heaven. а high street and not a mall in sight! We pulled

into the motel's car park and saw we weren't the only Harley there. Gleaming in the moonlight was a Streetglide. We never did find out who the riders were or where they were going...

We are great believers in recommendations and asked the motel receptionist where we might be able to do some wine tasting and if there was a good place to eat nearby. Given our attire she suggested a steak bar about 2 miles out. Rather than get back on the bike again she suggested a smorgasbord restaurant (mmm, we don't eat fish) and another eatery that we never found. Solvang was lovely to walk round but where were the people? It felt deserted but maybe that was because it was just after New Year and being about 7pm the shops were losed. If we ever go back I would definitely spend more time exploring this region.

After visiting a local bar in the town and sampling their wine/beer we togged up again and

rode out to The Hitching Post (famous hickory smoked steaks). The food was delicious and is home to split pea soup which we had for



starters flavoured with ham and fennel. In America salad is eaten before the main course. Personally I prefer mine with my main meal which confused the waitress but steak and chips without anything else? If you're in the area we would recommended eating here.

If you think, like us, that wine, especially the local produce, would be reasonably priced think again. No matter where we were, in a bar or restaurant, it worked out far more expensive than in the UK.

After а good night's sleep we read through the various local pamphlets and magazines and made outline plans for the day. The area of Los Olivios, a short trip north of Solvang was mentioned in all the literature and Los Alamos also piqued our curiosity. We knew that




our next overnight stop would be Santa Barbara which gave us a timescale for exploring so as to arrive at our hotel early evening.

Before setting off we had the free breakfast using the vouchers supplied by the motel. This consisted of a Danish pastry and coffee at a fabulous authentic Danish bakery across the road.

Rather than travel on the main road towards Los Olivios we chose to go along the Ballard Canyon Road. This was proper riding! It was narrow, bendy and undulating with vineyards and ranches all around us. Being on the bike there seemed no point stopping at Los Olivios to sample the alcohol but the scenery was gorgeous so we thought we'd stay in the area for a while. Initially we turned onto the 154E and very soon after took the Figueroa Mountain Road which looked promising and turned out to be great. After a few miles of straight road we started climbing as the road got steeper and bendier. There were people out walking and we saw some on racing bikes. Passing over a cattle grid the mountain road became

narrower and steeper as it snaked upwards. Arriving at the top we parked the bike and just stood there



marvelling at the view. It was stunning and one of those things that you know no matter how many

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videos or photos you take, they will never capture something as breathtakingly beautiful as this.

Although we would have loved to continue through the mountains we were on a time limit. Retracing our journey back to the 154 we headed north and then onto the 101 to Los Alamos. The Union Hotel was all it was cracked up to be in the leaflet. It was like stepping back in time with authentic furnishings from the late 1880"s. We could almost have been in the Wild West! After walking through the saloon doors we had a coffee and asked what sort of wildlife the area boasted. Well, raccoons, bobcats and mountain lions. The latter particularly liked bikers and there had been at least two attacks the previous year... Can they bite through Kevlar?

We had looked to see if there were any Harley dealers in the area but none were listed. It was with

surprise therefore that, seeing one just before Santa Maria, we had to turn round and drop in. Men are like putty in your hands in a Harley dealer. Just flutter your eyelashes



and point out some pretty tops with Harley on and they're magically bought for you!

David had always said it would be nice for me to have some cowboy boots to wear on the bike and we were in the right area to buy some, hence our detour to find the Boot Barn in Santa Maria. We didn't find the barn but we did find a pair of boots!

Our challenge now was to find Route 1 so that

we could start making our way back down south. From Santa Maria we followed the 101 north to Pismo Beach which looked just like one of our seaside resorts. Now on the



right road, Route 1, we looked for somewhere to have lunch. Because of the nature of Route 1 there is far less choice of places to stop for

refreshments than being on a main road. When we saw a real American type diner in two railway



carriages we couldn't believe our luck and it was even better inside with 50's type furniture.

Revitalised we set off again, through Guadalupe and Vandenberg Air

Force Base. Back into the fen-like region with what seemed liked billions of fields growing crops, fruit, veg

etc. and miles of poly tunnels. Overall I was surprised at how few cattle we saw during our trip considering the number of ranches. The terrain became hilly again which was nicer once we changed from Route 1 to the 101 at Las Cruces. We followed this all the way to Santa Barbara where we checked in at the Best Western overlooking the marina. Not the prettiest of buildings, the Oceana looked nicer, but our room was very comfortable. We walked to the pier a little while later where there were a few eateries. If you like shellfish there was one place where you could pick you own live lobster or crab from the tank for your meal. We set aside 30 minutes to walk round the harbour and pier is the daylight. It appeared to be serene but we were, after all, in low season.

Today the sea was much choppier with a brisk wind so there were oodles of surfers hanging 5's and 10's (technical term – ask David). The bike had to be back at Eaglerider by noon hence an early start. Following the same road back, Route 1 and 101, we started looking for somewhere to stop for a coffee as the remit was to sit by the beach. It took a while! We found one just past Santa Monica pier and supped coffee while enjoying the view knowing that our road trip was only a few minutes away from ending. Maybe another time we could cover longer distances if David hires an Electroglide!!! By the way, it was only as we handed the Heritage back that we saw it had a Florida number plate...
